#### **PARISH COUNCIL**

The Parish Council continues to work proactively on this year's two major projects, namely



the replacement of the street lights and the provision of new play equipment in the Swingfield. Great progress is being made and some exciting new play items should be installed in the Swingfield in the autumn. The lighting project continues apace and we are confident that we will have some very positive news to report in the autumn issue of this magazine.

Many residents will have noticed that there are a number of 'tidying-up' jobs requiring attention in the village, such as the siding out of grass on the pavements, the pruning of trees and the painting of the white gates at the village entrance. In several neighbouring villages such jobs have been carried out with the Community Payback scheme. The Parish Council has met with the Probation Service and arranged for members of the scheme to carry out community service within the village. The scheme very closely supervised managed by the Probation Service and has proved extremely successful in other towns and villages.

Residents are requested to trim hedges where applicable outside their properties to allow for easy pedestrian access on pavements.

We are very pleased that Mr Pothole has returned! The Parish Council is

liaising with Mark Morrell (aka Mr Pothole) to improve the state of the roads within the village. Some patching up work has already been carried out, but the ultimate aim is the resurfacing of the roads. We are pleased to report that the fence at the pocket park that was damaged by vandalism will be repaired in August.

Anglian Water would again like us to remind residents not to put insoluble items such as fat and baby wipes (even if the label says they will dissolve) into the drains as these cause the drains to become blocked, resulting in stress and inconvenience to people linked up to that particular part of the drainage system. A little care and forethought will solve the problem.

Finally, I would just like to say how magnificent the new jubilee tree on Wappenham Road is looking. For those who are new to the village, this tree was planted to commemorate the Queen's Diamond Jubilee in 2012 and is a 'sister tree' to the jubilee tree on the corner of Abbey Road and Main Road, planted in 1897 to mark Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee. If you stand by the tree in Wappenham Road you can see the one in Abbey Road. I wonder how long it will be before you can stand in Abbey Road and see the one in Wappenham Road?

#### LONG LIVE THE KING! - A VILLAGE PUB REVIEW

We have our village pub again and it's better than ever. After many years and a variety of tenant landlords all shackled to the same hopeless and greedy pub chain owners, our

wonderful King's Head passed into private ownership in April this year.

The village is very grateful to the last tenant Paul Greenwood who did a great job for two years and, at times, despite personal upheaval,

managed to keep our pub open with very little support from the pub owners who were only interested in selling the building and therefore were not bothered about spending money while the pub was on the market. Thank you Paul from us all—you are truly missed

The new owners have undertaken a refurbishment of the premises and accommodation block. In addition, the refit of the kitchen and the dining room have helped in rebuilding a customer base. However, they arrived with their eyes wide open and knew what was required.

The kitchen and dining refurbishment were completed first and food has continued to be served five days a week for several months now. Kath and I have personally sampled the food on several occasions and can attest to its high quality.

A whole new set of young smiling faces behind the bar and serving food has got

the whole pub buzzing and it has a beating heart again. The Kings Head is now a Free House and the new owners can obtain their supplies from wherever they can get the best deal. So we now have a different range of beers and lagers. The new owners, in a gesture to emphasize the point,

dropped the price of all ales and lagers by an average of 30p a pint. How welcome is that?

However, we do have to accept the transient nature of the majority of

customers at any one time (especially when food is served) and the parking can at times be cosy!

The Kings Head is now as it deserves to be - with the aroma of freshly cooked food drifting from the kitchen, smiling faces on both sides of the bar, a range of reasonably priced ales; open for longer hours but still the familiar faces of the villagers who like to pop in for a swift half!

There's still much to be accomplished. The front elevation and entrance needs smartening up to entice passers by.

The garden would benefit from being spruced up and the accommodation block refurbished but this will all happen in due course. They are also looking to recruit more staff to improve the service delivery which, to be honest, has been a problem when food demand is high. To be fair there

have been a small number of disgruntled customers but these are early days and things will get better. The problem is acknowledged and being dealt with.

In any village, the pub is the central hub for meeting people and finding out the latest gossip and spending time in the company of friends. For new people in the village the pub is the place to go to get to know people and to network.

We very nearly lost the pub altogether, and we must always be grateful to the consortium of determined business people within the village who came together to make a viable business case for a village buy out. They did a great job but it was done when the present owners had their offer accepted.

We are so lucky in Syresham to have all of the social facilities that many other villages lack. We have the primary school; a church and a chapel; a shop with post office; a sports and social club and of course the village hall, but now our Kings Head is back!

So please take the opportunity to visit the pub and sample it's new look and indulge yourself and have a meal there. You won't be disappointed I can assure you.

#### VILLAGE BUS SERVICE

The Parish Council has been working to





provide a convenient new bus service into Brackley and Banbury.

Discussions have taken place with

'ABILITY NORTHANTS'.

We are pleased to report that from *Thursday August 8th* there will be a bus at 11.30 a.m. (alight at Abbey Road, High Street and Village Hall) to Banbury. On Fridays there will be a bus to Brackley, (Alight at Abbey Road and High Street 9.30) and so it will continue weekly.

In order to use this service, residents must register with 'Ability Northants':https://abilitycic.org.uk/. Registration forms may also be obtained from the Village Post Office.

#### WHO ARE GIGACLEAR?

Back in the Spring Gigaclear requested to attend a Parish Council meeting to explain works that they will be doing under the Government Scheme of providing cable internet connections throughout the village. The project was explained and a start date was anticipated, but they have had to make some modifications to their planning, hence recent letters explaining their intentions. It is anticipated they will commence work outside the school during the summer break.

This project is Government funded, and at no cost to the Parish Council. Contractors will be carrying out the works in due course. The roads and pavements will be restored to proper condition. Junction boxes will be installed, and locations of those have been marked out throughout the village. Once the system is installed it will be for individual householders to decide whether they wish to be connected at cost to themselves. **EDITOR** 



#### SYRESHAM & DISTRICT HISTORY SOCIETY

Following the excellent talk about the fashion work of Mary Quant,

back in May, we are now looking forward to our annual guided walk visit in August. This will be in Buckingham and includes a visit to the Old Gaol in the town centre.

Our June meeting became somewhat problematic, when the speaker pulled out at short notice. We were however saved by Steve Dimmer from Northampton, who provided a dramatically performed focus on legend and myth in the county of Northamptonshire.

We heard from Bob Horner in July, about the history of Bletchley Park and its role as an espionage factory in the 1930s and during the war.

In September we will be having a further visit by Rosemary Leeper of Brackley History Society, and she will relate the second part of her talks about the history of Brackley.

October will see the AGM followed by a talk by Tim Healey, son of Dennis—his subject will be The Green Man legend.

From time to time we get enquiries about family tree research, most of which we are unable to help with.

However in early July, I had a request from two sisters in West Wales, regarding Albert Whitehead, their great uncle. He was one of the 33 village men killed

in the Great War.

He was son of Charles and Mary Anne
Whitehead—she came from Biddlesden. The 1911 Census has them living at Blenheim Cottage.



ALBERT & LIZZIE

Albert was engaged to be married to Lizzie Blackwell who lived at College Farm Cottages. Sadly, he was killed in action in June 1918, still carrying his family bible presented to him by Syresham Wesleyan Chapel. That bible still exists with the sisters in Wales today.

They were asking what happened to Lizzie, and wondered if she lived to have a happy life.

In fact Lizzie married Bertie Fuller in Brackley in the summer of 1920 and between them they ran the Haberdashery in Bell Lane, just below the Bell Inn public house.

I am especially pleased to discover that we have scored a success here!

#### ST JAMES INTERREGNUM

This year we have been told by The Bishop of Peterborough (our diocese), that if we raise £67,760 during this

calendar year, we will qualify, as a Benefice, for a full time priest (i.e. one day off per week). If we raise £61,000 we would be entitled to a five-days per week priest. Anything less than this would only qualify us to advertise for 0.5% of a priest.

In order to get to our parish share for 2019 of £15,246, we need to raise another £449 per month from Syresham.

We have some £230 per month or one half of the total already signed up, but there is some way to go.

We are grateful to those who have already increased their giving, or pledged to do so – we have some £150 per month or 1/3<sup>rd</sup> of the total already signed up, but there is some way to go.

In early September the Benefice Finance Committee will meet to review our position to date. At their last meeting, the committee was confident that, with active fundraising, they could raise enough for a 5-day priest. If we are unable to report an improvement across the Benefice, we expect the Diocese to advertise for a part time priest in January.

We have been lucky during the past months for the help of the Rev'd Paula Challen. She was the Curate at Tove Benefice, Towcester, and until she officially became the Rector of Tove on August 11th, has been helping us. We appreciate her enthusiasm.

She has attended many village events. Her last service in the Benefice will be on Sunday August 4<sup>th</sup> at Radstone. If anyone would like to make a contribution to a leaving present, please leave it at the Shop for my attention, or give it to me or Alice. And try to come to the service (and lunch) in the marquee.

This year we had the Summer Church Fete in the Church because of inclement weather. A dog show was an innovation and proved popular, despite the wet conditions.

Over £1,100 was raised and this and the St Nicholas Fair at Christmas are two of our most important fund raising events. Other fundraisers included Pop up Shops in the church in July and, to come, another Remembrance Eve Concert planned for Saturday 9<sup>th</sup> November.




We continue to enjoy our weekly Thursday evenings at the Village Hall. If you are interested why not pop along and see us and join in?




