PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

We extend a warm welcome to our new Parish Councillor, Russell Woolley. We

very much look forward to working with him in the future.

We are pleased to report that the D Day celebration on the evening of the 7th June was a great success. Sponsored by Parish Council and HS2, it was a great success.

Many of you will have noticed that work has been carried out on the pavement opposite the Chapel. Although the camber of the pavement is still not ideal, the Parish Council is concerned that it should not be further damaged by heavy vehicles mounting the pavement because of parked cars. We are therefore asking Highways to put double yellow lines on the narrow section of road opposite the Sunday School and the grassy bank. We await the result of our request.

Following the trial of advisory 20 mph signs, we are now requesting that the whole of the village should be made a 20 mph speed restricted zone. Again, we await the results of our request.

Residents are being encouraged to share their views on the Local Transport Plan presently being developed by West Northants Council. The plan details a range of proposals for transport over the next 20 years which aims to:

- Make public transport more attractive and accessible;
- Make active travel such as cycling or walking a first choice for short trips;

- Reduce dependency on private cars
- Make our transport system safer, cleaner and more inclusive;
- Improve transport infrastructure and transport services to make them more resilient:
- Achieve net zero.

WNC is very keen for residents, businesses, community groups, landowners and other stakeholders to have their say on whether they agree with the proposals in the plan. Drop in events are being held in the area – on Friday August 16th from 9 a,m, till midday at the Piazza in Brackley and online on August 21st and September 23rd. Further details are available on the West Northants website.

There is positive news for anyone who has a problem with *wasps nests* this Summer. WNC will identify the nest and eliminate it for you – *just give* them a call on 0300 123 7000.

Please be aware that the Parish Council website has a new address www.syreshamparishcouncil.gov.uk We are looking to improve the website and would welcome any suggestions residents might have.

Just another reminder that if you see any street problems such as potholes, overgrown hedges or vegetation, blocked drains, fly tipping, street lighting etc., these can be reported directly to West Northants Council on www.fixmystreet.com, where they should be promptly dealt with.

Finally, 'thank you' to Gary Lowther, for the work he has done for the Parish Council during the past year or so and to wish him well.

The King's Head reopened on Friday 12th July after a three week closure when the previous tenant left in the

middle of June after a twelve month tenure. The new tenant is one of our own!

Villager Alex MacIver-Bounden who, with his partner Megan, family members and friends, has worked hard to refurbish the pub and give it a fresh vibrant look and a new exciting lease of life.

Several villagers generously volunteered their skills and time to help with the refurbishment including the serious deep-cleaning that was needed throughout. The pub has been completely and tastefully been repainted throughout with tiling repairs the floor, grass cutting gardening, re-upholstering furniture, cellar sorting out the management. The initial theme for the pub is light and airy with a slimmed down range of beers and wines initially, until Alex and Megan can gauge exactly what will satisfy the locals' tastes. Staff uniforms will promote the pub with a new logo and provide а smart corporate look.

Food will definitely follow when the kitchen is up and running. Our hosts

are aware they must walk before they can run. They are taking their time after opening to get things right first time and are committed to putting in place long term food plans which the local community can finally and consistently rely on.

For instance, beside the kitchen food when it is up and running, the Thai food takeaway van is will be a regular fixture once a month, along with the weekly fish and chip van. Also, the wood oven pizza van and other food operations plan to be a regular feature. It's all in the advanced planning stage, so keep an eye on Facebook and social media for future updates as well as the funky advertising sign-boards inside and outside that have been gifted to Alex and Megan by yet another generous villager.

Personally, we were not there for the opening night as we were on holiday but we will be following up this article on how the King's Head is going for the next edition of the ST in November. However, we were involved in helping with some elements of the work carried out during the three weeks of refurbishment and we were thoroughly updated by friends in the village while we were away as to how the first evening went.

Opening night was a resounding unmitigated success! The pub was packed and a serious amount of BBQ food and beer was consumed. The word was out that the pub was back in business with a serious long term plan and as a result a huge number of

people came to check it out. They were not disappointed!!

Well done Syresham! A flurry of reviews followed next day on Facebook etc all saying the same thing about how great it was to be back there, everyone had a good time, the pub looked lovely inside, the beers were good.

As a village we are blessed with amenities we understandably take for granted but which other villages can only look upon enviously. We have the sports and social club, the sports field and summer cricket, the church, the chapel, a thriving and well run primary school, shop, post office, a fantastic village hall and of course our King's Head pub.

We are so lucky that two young people with drive and a vision and a realistic and workable business plan are so keen and willing to give our beloved King's Head another fighting chance to survive and thrive.

Alex and Megan have gone into this venture with their eyes wide open but we, as villagers, have to play our part too and support them. It's a win-win situation because our lovely Syresham village is enriched for having a pub that is a going concern.

On a mercenary note, it's worth bearing in mind any estate agent will tell you that a village which has the holy trinity of primary school, shop and a pub is much more desirable to potential house buyers and house prices will always reflect this. The hospitality industry in this country is in need of a business defibrillator in

these current times and it's a fact that 80 pubs are closing nationwide each week. It therefore follows that anybody who decides to take a risk on a pub and possess a determination on making a go of things must be applauded and supported by the village.

So Syresham, you must support your local pub. The pub needs you and you need the pub. We are very lucky to still have it thanks to these two, young entrepreneurial villagers and this situation can be yet another example of Syresham collectively pulling together to help a local cause. In the cottage at Syresham, 25 Bell Lane on

27th March 1933, Barbara Anne Geary was born. She had an elder brother and sister—Harold and Elsie. Later to be born came Gordon. Her father, Joseph worked on a farm and later as a roadman.

Her Mother Mary, kept the house and looked after the children.

Barbara attended school at the age of 4, and from age 6 could remember the Wartime, having windows in her home blacked out, and using gas masks, and food being rationed. She was able to see Coventry ablaze from a distance.

When she was 7, her mother passed away.

Her school day began with a bell being rung, and she remembers having a $^{1}/_{4}$ bottle of milk to drink. In her lessons she would knit socks and scarfs for the men in the army.

At Christmas time in her stocking, she would find things like an apple, an orange, a bar of chocolate and a few nuts. One of her jobs as a child was to look after the pigs, the chickens, cats and dogs.

At the age of 13, she did potato picking in school time. She would sing songs like 'Camptown Races', and 'Slow Boat to China' at school concerts. At 14, she left school and looked after her family. Straight away she started work at Lotus Shoe Factory in Westbury and when she got home, kept house for her father and youngest brother. When Lotus closed down she moved to True Form in Abthorpe.

Some of her evenings would be spent going to dances in Towcester, having fish and chip supper on the way home! She met her future husband Victor when they were both 18, he was in the army based at Biddlesden.

They began married life on June 27th 1953, at Brackley and lived in her family home, The Cottage at Syresham. They had two children, Janet and David. Victor became a painter and decorator and David joined him when he left school. Barbara and Janet kept the books. This became the family business which continues through David to this day.

Barbara started work again when David was 11. She worked at Syresham School as assistant cook with her good friend Rosemary. She also taught lace making, and had many enjoyable years lace making as a hobby, and teaching the grandchildren. Latterly enjoying jigsaws.

David helped his dad build their bungalow in Crowfield where they all lived. Sadly she lost Victor in 1992 and daughter Janet in 2015.

Sandra and the children often visited Crowfield on Sundays where lots of memories were made.

Needing more care towards the end of her life, she was looked after by David and carers at Brackley Fields Care Home. **VICTORIA HUGHES**

Breakfast Church meets twice a month and it is encouraging for children and parents to meet and watch and help the youngsters joining together and learning more about Jesus.



IRENE HAWKINS SEPTEMBER 1942 – JUNE 2024

Irene Billingham was born on September 26th 1942, in Northampton, the eldest of three children, and was

raised mostly by her Auntie Annie and Uncle Matthew, in their guest house on Hazelwood Road, Northampton. She adored her Auntie, and loved helping with the housekeeping. She also enjoyed meeting the touring actors who stayed at the guesthouse.

Leaving school at age 15, she worked at Boots and then Woolworths, where she was often asked by the manager to model the latest fashions around the town centre — she was always quick and happy to oblige.

When she was age 16, one Saturday night out with her friend, a young man from Syresham cheekily slid down the banister of the Central Tavern Pub, and promptly asked her out on a date. She agreed to meet him the following weekend. He just happened to go back to the same pub the following night, and so did Irene. The young man from Syresham said "What, couldn't you wait till next week?" Les and Irene have been together ever since!

Irene got a second job in a brewery to pay for the wedding. And they were married on November 5th 1960. They set up home together in a small

caravan on one of Patterson's fields, where Les worked as a farm labourer. Irene helped out with the sheep-shearing, rolling the fleeces. Irene also helped cutting faggot sticks in the woods. Their first child Keith was brought to their caravan home.

They moved to The Pound, where Alan and Denise were both born. At the tender age of 21 Irene had three children, all under 4 years old. Denise was born three days after Irene's 21st birthday, and Les claimed it was a delayed 21st birthday gift! Every day, she would walk up to Burnham Place with the children to visit her mother-in -law.

Later the same year Les gave her another surprise. He bought her a house! However she soon discovered the new home was a row of three derelict cottages next to the brook costing £1,250, her heart must have sunk. With help from George Jeacock and a borrowed tractor and trailer. they moved in. George told of huge holes in the roof, half a stair case, and how they shovelled the carpet off the floor! Over the next 60 years, Irene transformed the abandoned houses by the brook, into a beautiful family home, which she happily lived in for over 50 years.

Irene took on part time work while the children were young, with Mr Archer in his shop, and as Dinner Lady at Syresham CE School. She enjoyed a laugh—she was definitely not a 'work

and no play' person.

For much of her time she produced the estimates and invoices for the business, on one occasion finding herself locked in the office! Fortunately, Dot Dunkley was passing over the bridge and heard shouts for help, and came to the rescue. On this occasion Irene was not too pleased with Les!

Over time, Les bought more properties to let, and Irene was always ready to improve them, choosing kitchens, bathrooms and more and doing bits of decoration. When Alan and Rosemary bought number 40 Broad Street, Irene followed her friend, Maureen Gosling's advice on the use of Artex, very popular in the 1980s.

Irene loved music and dancing. She was always first onto the dance floor, and last to leave it, with Les always having the last dance together. Her favourite venue was The Salon Ballroom in Northampton. And the house was always alive to 60s music, especially Motown. However, her favourite was Tom Jones, and she loved the TV clips on You Tube.

Irene first showed signs of dementia around 14 years ago, and she was cared for at home in Syresham by Les, until it was necessary for her to receive specialist care. She moved to Brackley Care Home late in 2020, where she received outstanding care whilst also forming close bonds with her favourite carers. Before this she was the

embodiment of a social butterfly, a people person, and being so surrounded by her carers.

Her most cherished moments in the care home were during musical activities, when she would dance and sing across the hallways with her carers. She frequently revived her days in the church choir, singing hymns with Rosemary and Alan. And after a rendition of 'All Things Bright and Beautiful', she would hold out her hand and with a smile say "That's two pounds please!"

As her Dementia progressed, she would visit Crowfield to see Rosemary and Alan twice a week, having her hair done, taking lunch and helping with the afternoon tea. She was fond of their dogs, and would enjoy sunny days in the garden. Alan would come home to share "Tom Jones Teatimes", and more from the likes of Ella Fitzgerald.

Over the years she had many enjoyable holidays, in Cornwall, or jetting off to Spain, or the Tenerife time share. She always made the best of time with friends that she made along the way. She even undertook the challenge of towing a caravan!

Shopping was one of Irene's great pleasures, and she loved bargain hunting at Brierleys and the Market in Northampton. And she took great pride in her appearance, always looking glamorous.

She was a proud grandmother to Tim, Phoebe, Jade and Sam. And great

grandmother to Jenna and Carmen, being Nanny or Nan Nan to them. Tim has fond memories of time spent with his Nan Nan, especially his birthday, when the clown that his Mum had booked did not turn up. Irene rushed home with the clown outfit and make up and returned looking hilarious. However, Tim was not fooled by her appearance as a Jade fondly remembers clown! 'Nanny's Jelly', which famously never set, but tasted all the better for it! Sam recalls playing with his friends in the Swingfield park, and Nanny window appearing at the launching choc ices in their direction! Les said he realised how very lucky he was to have met Irene, and to have been with her for 64 vears. Irene passed away peacefully on June 8th 2024 at Brackley Care Home surrounded by her family. Her legacy will be in the love, kindness and compassion she leaves with her husband, children, grand-children and great grand-children and friends. Thank you for making the world a better place to be, for making each day more 'Bright and Beautiful.'






