DAVID BOWEN LIVES IN THE POUND AND SENT IN HIS ARTICLE ABOUT LONG DISTANCE RUNNING.....

On the 11th June I was flying the flag for Brackley and District Running Club in the 'South Downs Way 100' - a 100 mile point to point race over the South Downs. As well as running 100 miles there is 4,000m of vertical ascent (that's three times up and down Snowdon!) to make things interesting. I'd been falling in and out of love with running for a few months so my training was minimal and I was worried if I'd even make it round at all.

Unfortunately my alarm did not go off on the morning of the race, so I only just made it to the start for the briefing at 05.55 whist still eating my porridge! Sadly I didn't have time for my morning pint of tea and was feeling particularly flustered when the race set off at 06.00.

The run actually went to plan in the face of punishing hot and humid weather which lasted all day. I hit the 25 mile Checkpoint at 4:04 hours, 35 miles at 6:09 hours, and 54 miles at 10:13 hours.

Darren Long from the running club was at Mile 50 helping out at a checkpoint, so it was great to see his smiling face half way round. After this the hills became more serious and I started to slow down slightly taking a few walking breaks. The key to distance "Relentless Forward running is Progress", so I kept marching on to the 69 mile checkpoint arriving at 8:03 p.m. having been running for just over 14 hours.

At this point I was delighted only to have a further 30 miles to go so celebrated by eating fruit as I walked up another hill. The weather was cooler by now with a nice refreshing breeze.

I arrived at Southease at about 9:45 just as Russia equalised against England. My mate Chris provided lots of demotivating comments about how hard the last 16 miles are with three large climbs!

As we left the last checkpoint, 95.5 miles we had an hour to finish the last 4.5 miles, in order to be under my target time of 22 hours. We pushed on up the last big climb from Jevington, by which time the mist had come down and coupled with the dark meant visibility was poor and it was getting hard to make out the path let alone see any course markers.

Despite this we made really good time up the final climb, overtaking a few people who had passed us earlier in the day. Eventually we arrived on the outskirts of Eastbourne with 2.5 miles left to run around the town before we had to do our 400m lap of the sports ground.

Eventually the stadium came into sight, and we agreed that as we had

run the last 16 miles together we'd finish together, so we put on our happy faces and sprinted round the track to pick up our "100



Miles One Day" finishers belt buckle and t-shirt.

I finished in 53rd place, in 21hrs 47mins and 20 seconds. I'm really pleased with this time given my lax training, the humidity and hilly terrain.

I escaped the race with only a small blister on my little toe which I taped up at mile 69. My legs felt good and I was able to have a spin out on the exercise bikes in the gym the Monday afterwards and have a good stretch.

I've now done all four of the Centurion 100 Mile races and am feeling energised for my next ultra in July before travelling to Chamonix to



tackle the mighty Ultra Trail du Mont Blanc in August.

A good Harvest in the past meant money in the bank and food on the table. A bad Harvest brought disaster to a whole community. This meant all the community, young and old, would thank God for a successful harvest and celebrate by holding a massive party with food and dancing; during which some of the produce would be auctioned off. PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

First of all the Parish Council apologises for the fact that the Swingfield was closed for the first week and a half of the Summer holidays.

The timing was certainly not ideal, but the work that was carried out was essential to ensure that electricity supply remains sufficient for the village needs. We are pleased to announce that it is now open again and we hope that the children of the village (together with families) will now make full use of it during the holiday period.

The Parish Council is also pleased to announce that in the 2016 Northamptonshire Village of the Year Syresham gained runners-up status in both the medium sized village category and also the overall best village. There is still room for improvement, so we certainly have something to aim for

next year.

As you will see from the new bus timetable distributed with this copy of the Syresham Times, there have been cuts made to the daily bus service. This was brought about by the fact that Northamptonshire County Council decided to cease the subsidy they were giving to Stagecoach to run the No 88 bus route. The Parish Council invited Mr Steven Burd, the Managing Director of Stagecoach Midlands, to explain the reasons why they were unable to continue the full service, which was essentially lack of usage. Stagecoach are, however, continuing to run the peak time services to enable students and workers who use the bus to get to work and college.

Members of the Parish Council have again planted up the flower boxes at the entrances to the village and weeded the jubilee flowerbed in Abbey Road. We would also like to thank the children from the school who weeded and planted up the flowerbed at the front of the Village Hall.

Unfortunately we have to report that the plaque commemorating the planting of the tree in Wappenham Road for the Queen's Diamond Jubilee in 2012 has 'gone missing'. The Parish

Council feel that this is a very important part of our village heritage and will therefore ensure that it is replaced.

We also have to report that the traffic



sign at the entrance to High Street was recently damaged and the dog litter bin removed. If you see any suspicious or unwanted activity, do please report it to the Parish Clerk or direct to the Police using 999 for urgent issues or to 101 for less urgent incidents.

POST BREXIT - CHALLENGES FOR US ALL!

The recent Brexit Vote reminded me when in early 2014 Pope Francis of the Catholic Church complained about 'the tyranny of unfettered capitalism' with a reminder that humanity should be served by and not ruled by the wealthy. On the other side of the coin

the newspapers report a high dropout rate from the workforce who have given up looking for work. The Government doesn't even count them anymore as being unemployed - the future for them and their offspring is fettered in depression.

The social fabric of the UK is currently being stretched to its limits with money-stress, for example causing divorce and an increasing number of single parent households. Education and Health costs are exceeding the rate of growth of income and wealth but the widening gap is hitting the poor the hardest. Poverty is breeding crime and criminal organisations, broken families, beggars, prostitution, mass immigration and protest movements. So large has the gap become that the wealthy in South Africa and many parts of South America are forced to live behind walls and locked gates. Let us pray it doesn't come to that here! Too often conversation either abuses the 'idle poor' or the 'heartless rich'. The majority of workers are anything but idle while many of the so called Middle Class and Rich are very generous especially in supporting Charitable Organisations and their neighbours in distress. Opinion with unsupported statistical backup rules the roost those from all walks of life try to justify their particular stands.

We have however, in my modest view, reached a stage when we must jointly show concern for the increasing income inequality that is hitting our society while having to watch our manufacturing industry and its associated skills disappear.

To have allowed the EU vote and immigration to be blamed for the multiplying pressures on our society avoids the principal issue. It has been more profitable for the holders of capital to accumulate wealth by investing overseas with the available cheap labour than supporting a worthwhile standard of living at home for the majority. The country has developed as a consequence 'short term' attitudes stumbling unnecessary social hurdles with many falling rather than planning for the 'long term' needs for ourselves and our innocent children. Immigration from Europe today hardly compares with the 3 million - yes, 3 million -Brits who emigrated to Canada alone between the Wars!

At least we have two new words: Brexit and Boris, soon they might even be Trumped!
