### **SYRESHAM ST JAMES CE SCHOOL**

Our new nursery building is now open and we are very pleased and proud to have such an amazing space for our younger children to play and learn. The building has come at a crucial time when child care places in the area are limited and demand from working parents is increasing with the introduction of 30 hours funded places.



With an increased number of houses being built in the village we are sure that demand will increase further.

For many years we have had pre-school and more lately our nursery operating on a part-time basis in the school hall. However, following a grant that we won through the DfE and money raised by the Pre-school Charity along with school funds, we have been able to finance the building of a brand new nursery with two rooms to accommodate children from 2 to 4 years of age.

The building has been designed to enable the children to be independent within the environment. Easily

accessible toilets and wash basins positioned between the two rooms provides a safe environment to encourage self-care for children of all ages. The rooms have been carefully



planned with resources clearly labelled and accessible to the children all day every day, allowing the children to facilitate their own play and learning alongside pre-planned adult led activities.

The children have very quickly settled into their new 'home' and are all happy and comfortable in their environment. With full daily sessions on offer we have seen a big increase in the number of children within the setting across the week. Without the need to 'pack away' at the end of each session children's play and learning is enhanced, allowing staff more time with each child and providing on-going support and teaching for those in their care. Being part of the school the children in nursery benefit from many of the curricular and extra-curricular activities that take place. Nursery children are able to have a hot school meal, milk and fruit on a daily basis. Children take part in Music lessons with a specialist teacher and PE lessons led by a sports coach who both work in the school for 1 day a week. They take part in Assemblies, phonics sessions and some playtimes. The older year 6 children lead 'guided reading' and pre-school aged children join the reception class for an afternoon each week. The staff also benefit from being part of the school as training is delivered by the Headteacher to all members of staff as well as the management of curriculum planning and pupil progress. This ensures that as children grow and develop during their nursery years, we can ensure that they make good progress and are 'school ready' by the time they reach the Reception Class.

We are very lucky to have a dedicated team of skilled nursery staff working with our children. However, with demand for places growing we are on the look-out for trained Level 3 child care workers to join our team. If you are qualified or know anyone who would be interested in taking a position at school, please contact the office on **01280-850269**.

We are looking forward to being able to show members of the community our nursery in due course, in the meantime we still have places available to children aged 2-3 so please ring for an appointment to have a look around.

First of all a belated Happy New Year to all residents of Syresham Parish!



As you are all aware from the notice delivered to every household, South Northants District Council has received notification οf Punch Tavern's intention to sell the Kings Head. As this has been registered as an Asset of Community Value, the residents of Svresham have been given opportunity to set up a Community Interest Group which could be treated as a potential bidder for the asset. Several people have expressed their interest and the Parish Council now intends to hold a Public Meeting in the Village Hall on Friday 16th March at 7.30 p.m., which every resident is invited to attend. We feel sure you will agree that a pub is an integral part of the heart of any village community and we must do all we can to ensure that we do not lose it.

We also recently sent questionnaire on Street Lighting in the parish. We would like to thank all those who completed the questionnaire and made various interesting comments. The results are in the process of being collated and the Parish Council will then decide on their course of action.

The Parish Council has now purchased a defibrillator that will very soon be located on the wall of the Chapel Sunday School. There will be two training courses for residents to Sunday School.



Police has relaunched a free message alert system, to help people in Northamptonshire be much better informed about crime and police activity in their local area, and keep

The messaging service now has greater functionality than previously, allowing frontline police officers to send alert messages direct from their mobile devices to thousands of local people.

The alert service is free and simple to activate by registering at <a href="https://www.northamptonshireneighbourhoodalert.co.uk">www.northamptonshireneighbourhoodalert.co.uk</a> and is available to anyone living or working in Northamptonshire.

After signing up, people will receive regular alerts from Northamptonshire Police, Neighbourhood Watch and other partner organisations, keeping them up to date and informed about crime and issues relevant to them and the area where they live or work.

Alerts are received either by email, text message or voice message — whichever suits. People will also be given the option of what they want to receive alerts about, and how often — you will only receive messages about topics that you have selected.

We concluded 2017 with a musical and festive entertainment with David Wornham from Worcester. demonstrating a wide range of early and modern wind instruments. We enjoyed a Wassail cup and snacks of cheese and biscuits. January's meeting fell on the day after New Year's day was rather minimally supported, however those who were there watched the film Race—the story of sprinter Jesse Owens and the

Berlin Olympics of 1936. It was an interesting film depicting the political scenarios of the time against a background of racism and the rise of Nazism in Germany.

Our February meeting sees a visit from Rosemary Leeper of Brackley History Society, Rosemary will be giving the first of a two part account of the history of Brackley.

In March. Professor John Hunter of Birmingham University will be telling about the work of Forensic Archaeologists, dealing with remains of victims of crime and other issues. ### LAST PANTO IN THE VILLAGE HALL

Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs is

our 20th panto, but we pass this milestone with a sadder landmark ... the last ever panto in the present Village Hall! It's sadder than that! No, even sadder than that!!

I shall be very sorry to see the Village Hall demolished, after 50 plus years of dances with live bands, weddings, christenings, funerals, fashion shows, art exhibitions, bingos, quizzes, bowls, ballroom dancing, discos, coffee mornings, pantos and loads more I don't even know about!

The hall has been host to many wonderful occasions ... BUT ... its time has come to a natural end. The roof leaks, the floor is subsiding and it is not suitable for a community hall in the 21st century. Bearing in mind it was a barrack hut gifted to Syresham by RAF Halton and only meant to last 5 years, ... it hasn't lasted too bad!

The new Village Hall is fantastic! I have the privilege of making a documentary of its construction, from the first clod of earth removed for foundations, until its present state at the point of first fittings of electrics, windows, plastering and heating. It is very exciting to see its growth!

It will be a wonderful legacy for many generations, with modern day facilities for all activities. I hear the odd moan, it's too far out of the village and no bigger than the old one. Firstly it is much bigger than the old one. In fact

you could fit the old one inside the new one! As for its position ... I timed

myself walking from the old hall to the new hall at a leisurely pace and it took 1 minute and 12 seconds!

I can't wait to produce our first pantomime in the new

Village Hall next year, with its lighting and sound facilities built in, extra seating and catering facilities. We should be able to make our shows even more spectacular!

I would like to thank another excellent facility in the village, Syresham Sports & Social Club. For 18 years, they have allowed us to rehearse in the clubroom and put up with us! 


