Lib was a truly local girl, born in Daventry on 28th September 1944, to Bill and Irene Harris. It was always a close family and they moved to Brackley where they

lived at the Police Station. Lib went to school in Brackley and liked to reminisce about playing in the cells. Upon Bill's retirement from the police force they moved firstly to The Grove and then after his death to 38 High Street. When Irene became fragile, Lib cared for her at home till her death in 1989. In all she must have lived in Syresham for over 60 years.

She joined Barclays Bank as a very young woman and her career in Branch Banking lasted three decades. Lib and her colleagues really were part of the community and she gained much satisfaction from serving customers many of whom she got to know personally. Lib made many friends during her career, and socialising at

Barclays in Buckingham must have closely rivalled that of Syresham. Lib underwent a big change in her life when she left the camaraderie of the bank to become a book keeper for local businesses. Naturally she made more friends amongst her clients whilst making use of the expertise she had gained at the bank.

Lib's life revolved around friends and

family. She was not just good at making friends but also at keeping them. So many friendships were made childhood and her early years at Barclays. She managed remain in the lives of so many. Village friends have been very important to her over many vears, and enabled her to live a wonderful social life.

Over the years friends have provided huge amounts of care and affection with both Judith and Rob giving her a home after surgery or during illness, whilst other friends have supported her towards the end of her life. Everyone was surprised at the speed of her deterioration in the last few weeks, but friends helped her make the best of the situation. Those same friends have supported the family with incredible kindness, which is very much appreciated.

Lib has kept close to family, especially cousins Ann and Sharon and to Ann's children. Gareth lives in Germany, but Rachel was able to attend the funeral.

Lib liked to introduce me as her 'sister -in-law' as my brother, Brian was her

partner before his unexpected death in 2005. They shared days out holidays and very generously hosting my father and uncle on Sundays when they lived in a nursing home. Lib has remained an important part in our lives and was a regular at Christmas and Easter gatherings. She really enjoyed time with my brother David, and the younger generation too - Claire and Tom and Eddie (to whom she was great aunt). She was disappointed not to be able to make Tom's July wedding. Her elegant wedding outfit for the day was put to good use as we said goodbye to her.

Lib was always a generous hostess and a notable baker and cook. Indeed for many years she gave her time and expertise to the Village Hall Coffee Mornings. She was a keen member of the Syresham History Society and U3A, and always enjoyed a good Quiz Night! Something not yet mentioned is Lib's style. She always dressed very well and was a world class shopper. birthday and Christmas cards were very special and a Lib wrapped gift could always be spotted from the other side of the room, being expertly wrapped in very superior paper! She also chose very stylish items for her home even including her toaster! At the press of a button, the bread descends into the toaster and then with a beep it gently emerges as toast. It reminds me of Lib—elegant, capable, stylish and always with a sense of fun.

So many of us will miss her very much, but will be able to draw on lots of happy memories of times spent together.

Well done Lib, a life well lived.

SHEDDING TIERS—HOW WE GOT TO HERE

In 2020, Northamptonshire County

Council (created in 1888) and South Northamptonshire District Council in 1974) (created were both abolished. This



article aims to provide context to the move to a new unitary system of local government.

'Two-tier' and 'Unitary' are the commonly used terms for alternative local government systems but risk overlooking the important contribution of parish and town councils to local communities. Northampton recognized its importance, so recently formed a new town council.

government structure controversial. Most would agree that local councils should be large enough to be efficient in providing services but small enough to be accountable to local people. Beyond that, opinions differ – not least because this is about political power. The courts have regularly been asked to intervene in disputes where councils disagree on how to restructure an area.

last introduced England comprehensive new structure 50 years under **Fdward** Heath's ago, government; in 1974 a complex and outmoded system was replaced with a universal two-tier system. Counties dealt with high-spend services like schools, social care and highways, and district/borough/city councils responsibility for more local services such as planning, housing and waste collection. Prior to losing the 1970 general election, the previous Labour government had been poised to adopt unitary councils for the whole of England (apart from London and the 'metropolitan' surrounding areas Manchester, Birmingham Merseyside, which would be two-tier). Northamptonshire would have become a single unitary council.

Interestingly, both Labour and Conservative proposals initially proposed moving Brackley and Brackley Rural District (including Syresham) into Oxfordshire.

Conservatives quickly developed distrust of counties in metropolitan areas, usually controlled by Labour; and didn't like the 'new' counties of Humberside, Avon and Cleveland. Margaret Thatcher dealt with the first issue in 1986 by abolishing (without replacement) the metropolitan counties and the Greater London Council. Strategic coordination suffered, and elected mayors and assemblies for London and for England's large urban conurbations became necessary to fill the void.

John Major's administration in the early 90's, had the Banham commission carry out a phased review of English local government structures. Unitary councils were set up in former Humberside, Avon and Cleveland as well as some

urban areas (including locally, Milton Keynes, Peterborough and Leicester). Rutland (population 37,000) was recreated as a unitary council. Banham recommended that the existing two-tier structure in Northamptonshire retained but that Buckinghamshire should be split between three unitary councils; he resigned when these, and other, recommendations were referred back by the government. Banham's successor initially recommended that the town of Northampton be given unitary status, but dropped the idea "the concluding separation Northampton from its county would have a significant and detrimental effect".

Patchwork re-organisation continued under Tony Blair's government with, in 2009, single unitary councils being created in Cornwall, Wiltshire, Shropshire, Northumberland and Durham. Bedfordshire and Cheshire were split into two unitary councils each.

Conservative-led governments from 2010 adopted a policy of initiating change only where there was local agreement on a new structure. There hasn't been a rush. So, now we reach the recent restructurings for Buckinghamshire and our own Northamptonshire.

In Buckinghamshire the former county council promoted a single council. District councils agreed that structures needed to change and proposed two unitary councils — one to cover the existing Aylesbury Vale area and another for the rest. The government

preferred one council and, after first considering legal challenges, the district councils acquiesced. The new council covers a population of about 550,000.

In Northamptonshire the proposal for re-organisation came after a government inspector examined finances at the county council and concluded that there was "evidence that the council had failed in its best value duty ... failures at the council were not due to a lack of funding, but a result of poor management, a lack of budgetary control and a culture which discouraged challenge".

The inspector advised that two new unitary councils be formed. The government asked the county's local authorities to submit a proposal for restructuring and the submitted proposal was agreed by government and implemented in 2020 with the first elections in May 2021.

West Northamptonshire Council (population circa 400,000), comprises the district areas of Daventry, Northampton and South Northants.

North Northamptonshire Council (population circa 350,000), comprises the rest of the old Northamptonsire.

So, after this 50-year game of musical chairs, here in Syresham, we are back where we very nearly started — with a unitary council. Good local government involves accountability to service users, council taxpayers and voters. In the past county councils, particularly, have been accused of being remote and unresponsive to their population. It remains to be seen

how well the new councils will manage accountability.



A43 AND ROADWORKS

Back in late 2019 the A43 from the M40 junction 10 to north of Towcester was in an appalling condition. With

hundreds of potholes, loss of wearing surface and other defects.

I carried out a complete survey in both directions. Following this I made a formal complaint and issued a Section 56 legal notice under



the Highways Act on Highways England, as it was then.

Following this action there have been multiple major works starting on the A43. Which is seeing much improvement over the last 18 months and with hopefully more to come.

The current northbound works from Brackley to Silverstone are due to be completed by mid March. Tarmac Ltd who are carrying out this project have worked hard to minimise disruption to residents, businesses and road users. They have had to accommodate many HS2 works which has impacted their programme.

VICTOR BROOKS 25TH MARCH 1925 - 9TH DECEMBER 2021

My father, Victor Brooks, passed away just before Christmas. His funeral took place in the village church on January 7th and was attended by around 40 friends and family.

Dad moved into Syresham with my mother, Jo, in 2014. They had previously lived in

Water End, a small hamlet near Hemel Hempstead in Hertfordshire, for over 50 years, but felt as they got older that the time had come to move to a larger village with more amenities and family support.

Dad was born on the 12th March 1925, in Fyfield, Oxfordshire. He spent his formative years growing up in Kingsbury, north London. In 1943, he enlisted in the RAF and, after the usual military induction, was transferred to Oban in Scotland where he trained on PBY Catalina flying boats. The following year he was posted to India, where he remained until the end of the war, returning home to be demobbed in 1946.

In India, he crewed Catalinas with the rank of Flight Sergeant and then, later,

Warrant



Officer. His principal role was as Flight Engineer, which basically made him responsible for keeping the engines and other critical flight systems running so the plane stayed in the air!

After he left the RAF, he secured a training placement at the Hertfordshire Institute of Agriculture studying all aspects of horticultural practice and science. He subsequently worked for Wembley Council as Head Gardener, before being offered a job with Lambeth Council in south

London. A few years later, in 1954, Dad married my mother, Jo Baker, in Keynsham, near Bristol.

Dad remained with Lambeth Council for over 25 years, where he became a senior Local Government Officer with responsibility for parks and cemeteries. He was also one of the leading organisers of the Greater London Horseshow that took place every year on Clapham Common.

After he retired, he was busier than ever! He worked as a Steward for the Royal Agricultural Show, with responsibility for organising the Flower Show. He was sought after as a highly respected judge at many of the town, county and regional shows, and for several years judged Britain in Bloom.

If that wasn't enough to keep him busy, he was a valued member of Great Gaddesden and Water End Parish Council, becoming Chairman for many years, helped to found the Water End Conservation Society, and took an active role in many community events.

It was only in his last few years that

Dad became increasingly infirm and, together with Mum, moved into Syresham where they were soon involved in various groups, including the History and Gardening societies, the Friendship Club and coffee mornings. He delighted in spending time in his garden and greenhouse, and in 'recovering' afterwards with the assistance of a single malt whiskey!

To all who knew him, he was a kind, generous and warm-hearted man. He had a wicked sense of humour and, when we were children, delighted in finding ways to amuse us, or play practical jokes. In many respects, although the jokes may have matured over the years, he retained his good-humour, positive outlook and abiding warmth right to the end.

Thanks to everyone who signed the letters for Andrea Leadsom MP and Shane Snow. They helped us reach the position where we are able to announce the following progress:

- The shared use pathway has been incorporated into the draft plan of the LCWIP, Local Cycling and Walking Infrastructure Plan, from Brackley to Silverstone,
- The provision of a shared use path crossing over HS2 rail line is closer to being resolved,
- ◆ The Parish Council in Syresham is fully supportive and actively engaging with HS2 liaison groups in the stakeholders' meetings.
- The B4525 (Welsh Lane) path is to be audited and considered for inclusion in the Brackley draft LCWIP.

However, to progress this into reality, requires further action and support.

SNATRA is proposing to form a not-forprofit association and needs your help to form a steering group. If you can become actively involved as part of the steering group, particularly if you live in Crowfield, Pimlico, Brackley Hatch, Whitfield, Radstone or Helmdon, please contact SNATRA43@gmail.com. As Shane Snow of the Department for Transport has said: "this is an opportunity that, if missed, may not occur for another 120 years or so."

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
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
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
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
