Today a young woman I know is spreading fliers with her number through the neighbourhood, so that the elderly may have someone to call on.

All over the world people are slowing down and reflecting

All over the world people are looking at their neighbours in a new way

All over the world people are waking up to a new reality

To how big we really are.

Yes there is isolation,
But there does not have to be

Yes there is panic buying.
But there does not have to be meanness.

Yes there is sickness, but there does not have to be disease of the soul. Yes there is even death.

# READ IN CHURCH BY MALCOLM ORR EWING THE VILLAGE SCHOOL IN THE EARLY FIFTIES

I was evacuated to Syresham in 1940 to my grandparents in Broad Street (right opposite King's brewery, that was!) - how great to be with family.

After the war I returned to my Coventry home in order to attend school. However in 1951 I had reason to leave home – where would I go? – Syresham of course!

Naturally I attended the local CofE school which had 3 classrooms (eventually 4) ranging from infants to

the then leaving age of 15 years, consequently there was quite a range of age groups in each class.

Mr Harvey was the Headmaster and my teacher until I left school in 1955. He was a very fair head and I got on well with him. Initially, as I started mid-term, I could not attend woodworking lessons in Brackley on Mondays so I had to stay with all the girls and enjoy country dancing, which I certainly did! - but still cannot dance!!

I enjoyed all of my time at the school both with the staff and students. Ironically, I ended up in Coventry working at a teacher training college – eventually teaching Her Majesty's Inspectors of schools (HMI's) how to utilise Television in an educational environment.

In my time at Syresham school I can only recall two students (one male and



one female) who passed to go to Grammar School in Brackley

When I left school, I was apprenticed to an electronic engineer at the then Plessey Company in Towcester.

My great grandparents owned the Kings Head, and my great great grandparents owned the Green Man Inn – not in my time obviously.

Where the wealth went, who knows!! Consequently, I still have a lot of 'Syresham' in me.

#### **VICTORY IN EUROPE DAY—75** YEARS ON

May 8<sup>th</sup> 1945 saw the end of hostilities

in Europe, after one of the most awful conflicts to hit the world.

The war continued in the Far East and the Pacific, until 15th August following the awful devastation caused by the first ever atomic bombs dropped on Nagasaki and Hiroshima.

The war came to Syresham in the form of



evacuee children (See Keith Friday's article), and some



military activity nearby, as well as the Home Guard, Captained by Bob King. There was considerable RAF training activity in the nearby airfields. The flyers and crews from Silverstone, Turweston and other airfields were often seen in both village pubs, the local

children learning interesting songs!

The 14<sup>th</sup> (Brackley) Battalion was raised in May 1940 as part of Towcester and Brackley Group, Local Defence Volunteers (LDV). Company - in Syresham. They would keep watch from the Brewery Tower in Broad Street. Old Park Farm was hit, and buildings were destroyed, as German bombers ejected their bombs near the sewage works.

Lives changed dramatically, and rationing of food etc. was significant. The young boys were formed into a Messenger Group supporting the Home Guard. Captain King personally kitted the boys out. The village also formed a Nursing and First Aid Group—how many do you recognise? Have you noticed the First Aid sign on the Sunday School? Life under rationing was harsh, and food was in short supply. The whole nation celebrated the close of the war, and great fun was had all over the country, including In Syresham.

#### THE ULTIMATE SACRIFICE

Four men failed to return to Syresham when the War came to an end (compared to the 33 villagers who were lost to the Great War) . They are remembered on the village War Memorial as well as the Chapel, Church and School. The men who didn't come home:

Name, Rank, Number: Wallace Pennell, Second Lieutenant, 301527

Fell/Age: 10<sup>th</sup> November 1943, age C.28 (born in late 1915)

 $\textbf{Regiment:} \ \, \textbf{General List, serving with the 8}^{th} \ \, \textbf{Grace Registration Unit, previously}$ 

serving as a Sergeant in the Royal Artillery

**Home details**: Son of Charles and Sarah Pennell of Abbey Road. His father had served in the First World War and was a horseman/agricultural labourer, his mother was a housewife. He had a brother, Joseph.

Buried: Massicault War Cemetery, Tunisia, North Africa

**Part in the Second World War:** Second Lieutenant Pennell died after the fighting in Tunisia ended. It is likely he was promoted in the field and this was his first appointment as an officer. Killed on the same date, and buried in the same cemetery, is a Private William Moore of the 6<sup>th</sup> Grave Registration Unit. It is likely both men were killed whilst recovering bodies. This could have been an accident, due to booby-traps left by the retreating Germans or down to disturbing unexploded ordnance.

Name, Rank, Number: Robin Bury, Lieutenant, 287459

Fell/Age: 30<sup>th</sup> September 1944, age 26

Regiment: General List, serving with "L" Detachment of the SAS

**Home details**: Son of Captain Eric and Mrs Dolores Bury. His father had served in the Royal Engineers in the First World War, being awarded a Military Cross, he died in November 1918. Lieutenant Bury's mother was remarried to Major Herbert Cory and they lived in the Gatehouse.

Buried: Phaleron War Cemetery, Greece

#### Part in the Second World War:

Lieutenant Bury's unit was deployed in Operation Manna, the liberation of Greece. Lieutenant Bury was killed off the coast of Salonika on a caique boat, used by the SBS to blend in and get into the coastline as easy as possible. It is believed he was killed in a friendly fire incident involving Greek partisans who thought the boat he was in contained communist fighters. He is buried in Phaleron War Cemetery just outside Athens. He is also remembered on the Monewden Church window, Memorial in Suffolk and the SAS memorial in the Highlands, Scotland. Name, Rank, Number: Thomas Hawkins, Private, 5890223

Fell/Age: 22<sup>nd</sup> March 1945, age 25

Regiment: 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion, Northamptonshire Regiment

Home details: Son of John and Alice Hawkins, husband of

Frances, father of Leonard. He lived in Bell

Lane with this family, moving to Abbey

Road when he married in 1942. His son, Leonard, was born in 1943. Tom picked the name himself, biking to Brackley to register the birth, and only telling his wife when he returned! Tom's brothers, Stan, Les and Roland are still living in the village today.

Buried: Taukkyan War Cemetery, Burma

Part in the Second World War: Private Hawkins joined the Northamptonshire Regiment in 1940, training with the 6<sup>th</sup> Battalion before transferring to the 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion who were fighting in Burma (now Myanmar). By recapturing Burma from the Japanese the British would guarantee the safety of India. The cemetery where Tom is buried was created after the War and brought in various cemeteries around Burma, including burials of men in the field. It is likely Tom was killed in action, buried by the battalion in a clearly marked location, then moved to his current resting place after the War. Tom was well known in the village and his death came as a shock to many, my grandfather always told me what a shock it was to find out as a boy in the village. It is perhaps more poignant with the war against the Japanese ending in August 1945, five months after Tom was killed.

Name, Rank, Number: Amos Payne, Driver, 11417634 Fell/Age: 23<sup>rd</sup> June 1945, age circa23 (born mid-1922)

**Regiment:** Royal Army Service Corps

**Home details**: Son of Joseph and Bessie Payne and brother to Esther, Dennis and Maurice who lived in a Bungalow at the bottom of Bell Lane. His father was a labourer and his mother a housewife.

Buried: Bari War Cemetery, Italy

Part in the Second World War: Driver Payne served with the Royal Army Service Corps – the logistical force of the British Army. The war in Italy ended on the 2<sup>nd</sup> May 1945, when the German and Italian forces officially surrendered. Amos and his fellow servicemen in Italy were nicknamed the D-Day Dodgers as they were

fighting in Italy when D-Day occurred in June 1944, meaning they were very much forgotten. Amos was killed after VE Day, on 23<sup>rd</sup> June 1945 in Italy. He is buried in Bari War Cemetery on the Adriatic coastline. It could be that Amos was wounded in the ammunition explosion in Bari Harbour on 9<sup>th</sup> April 1945 and was being treated in the 98<sup>th</sup> General Hospital based in Bari. Or, as sadly was the case with many men, he died in an accident whilst driving supplies. No doubt Amos would have taken a moment of reflection on VE Day in 1945, yet he did not return to Syresham to carry on his life where he had left it on joining the army.





Residents are encouraged as much as is possible with lock-down to observe May 8th as a Day of Remembrance, for the close of hostilities.

- Decorate your windows and gardens with Red, White and Blue bunting and flags
- Pause by the Memorial Stone in Abbey Road on your walk around the village, and remember the fallen
- Maybe have a family picnic in your garden or indoors if necessary
- Join in Applause at your door on Friday 8th, 8.00 p.m. and enjoy singing along with the Vera Lynn melodies:- We'll meet again and There'll be Bluebirds over the White Cliffs of Dover

However you choose to remember VE Day, take a minute or two to remember the men of this village who gave their lives for your today.
