From the Editor's desk

It is one hundred years ago now, since the cessation of hostilities and the Great War came to an end.

Over 100 Syresham men went to the front, and 33 lost their lives on active service or subsequently through injury.

The village will be marking the passing of that centenary with an Armistice Concert in the Church on Saturday November 10th, and the annual Remembrance Service at the Memorial Stone, 10.45 - Sunday 11th November.

The History Society is working with the Church together with Brackley Wind Ensemble and Milton Keynes Makes Music choral group to ensure this date is marked.

Less well known is the massive impact of the so called Spanish Influenza, which took the lives of many millions of people across the globe during the latter days of that war.

Glasgow was first affected in the UK, in May 1918, and within weeks it had spread to London and almost a quarter of a million died two months.

One wonders how a small community like Syresham was affected by the pandemic, if at all?

If there is to be another similar Pandemic, it may be decades away, it could be quite mild or very severe?

We will not know till it happens.

Syresham Village Hall's

Grand Opening took place on 30th June. The idea was originally conceived twenty-one years ago, when a local landowner generously offered the committee a parcel of land on which to construct a new building to replace the old wooden hall. The project proper took three years, with the construction phase lasting twelve months.

I was recently showed around this fantastic new building by Committee Chair, Christina Munsey. By no coincidence, the weekly Thursday Café was taking place, and I was entertained to delicious coffee and cakes!

The facilities include a main hall, meeting room, modern kitchen/bar, toilets (plus a disabled toilet with baby changing facilities), a library, parking and an outside picnic area.

The main hall measures 16.1m by 9.1m. Light and airy, the spacious hall has a kitchen at one end and space for a large demountable stage at the other, together with ample, wellplanned storage for the mums and tots group and other users. As well as free WiFi, the hall has а comprehensive sound and projection system, with hearing loop. A fover connects the main hall to the smaller meeting room and kitchen. Outside, there is a large terrace with picnic benches and lovely rural views. A convenient pathway leading from the centre of the village via Syresham's Sports and Social Club makes the hall very accessible by foot. But there is also ample parking for those who choose to drive.

Syresham Village Hall's Thursday Café is a veritable institution, having been a long-standing fixture of the old hall. Since its inception in 2008, the Café has been taking place every week apart from an annual fortnight's break.

Open from 10.30am until 12.30pm, the Café is manned by a rosta of volunteers, who make the mouth watering cakes and serve the refreshments. The Café has a large band of loyal supporters both from within the village and further afield and attracts many passing cyclists. For £2 you have a choice of cake with either a pot of tea or freshly brewed coffee. Proceeds from two weeks are donated to charity—this year, Christian Aid and Macmillan. And I can personally vouch for the deliciousness of the cakes...

Many congratulations to the Management Committee, Steering Committee and Project Manager (Adam Jeskins) for overseeing the construction of this impressive new hall.

DAVID CHARLES WYNESS 'DAVID'

May 23rd 1938 to August 23rd 2018 Extract from the Eulogy at Banbury Crematorium, September 13th 2018.

Charles David Wyness, largely known as David, was born in Ormskirk Lancashire in 1938. He lived with his mother Lois, father Charles and his brother Peter. Sadly his mother died when he was young and he was separated from his brother when father Charles



was called up for World War II duties. David moved south to Newbury to stay with family, returning to Ormskirk with his brother in 1942.

On leaving school he joined the RAF where he met up with Gillian, at a dance evening, and were married in Banbury in 1960. Serving in the forces meant they moved a lot in the UK and then settled in France for a year. On returning to the UK. Their first son Jonathan was born in Leighton Buzzard. After a short time in Cyprus David left the RAF and they moved to Charlton where Richard was born in 1968.

It seems the Wyness family were keen campers here at home and abroad, however on some such expeditions, things were prone to go wrong.

On one French trip, after a picnic Gillian left her handbag on the roof of the car, resulting in the bag and its contents being spread over the road, including all their French Currency! David and his brother in law were to be seen running about the motorway dodging cars retrieving the crisp banknotes. On completion of the task, brother in law Mark lit a cigarette to relieve the stress of the previous activity. On throwing the butt on the ground he was amazed

> to see the grass verge aflame in seconds. The family' supply of bottled water was used to put out the inferno!

> On another occasion in North Wales, after a night of torrential rain, they awoke to discover the tent was surrounded by the lake which had originally been over

400 metres away. In their attempts to break through they discovered the water was now 2 feet above the nearby bridge and access road out of the farm. The car cut out and they had to wait to be rescued to a nearby Bed and Breakfast to dry out.

Gillian and David had busy lives, she was a District Nurse and he worked for the Foreign Office as well as running a TV rental and repair business.

In 1983 they bought the Red House which was turned into a very successful and highly regarded 25 room nursing home, finally retiring in 2001.

In the closing years of his life they enjoyed the comfort of an apartment in Tenerife, inviting many friends to stay and enjoy. He always enjoyed his gardening and when they moved to the bungalow on Wappenham Road in 2002, he finally had the time to create a haven which kept him still busy, and where they both spent happy hours overlooking the fields from the conservatory

Thanks to the Wyness family for this tribute to a much loved man.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Syresham Parish Council continues to work for the benefit of the parish, generously giving their time and expertise to improve the environment in which we live and to ensure that our village continues to be a thriving community.

You may have noticed that the flower boxes at the entrances to the village have recently been replaced, thanks to one of our Councillors, Mervyn Williams. The sturdy new boxes will soon be replenished with plants for the winter season.

Our new footpath wardens, Steph and Geoff Brackpool, are doing a sterling job. The footpaths are a source of pleasure for many village residents and it is the duty of the Parish Council to make sure they are freely accessible to all. The Parish Council will therefore be asking landowners to ensure that they keep all footpaths unblocked and provide stiles to give access between fields.

Parking in the village continues to be one of the issues we need to address and the Parish Council therefore requests all residents to be respectful of other road users and pedestrians when parking vehicles. Please note that if a vehicle is causing an obstruction the driver is committing a legal offence and should therefore be reported to the police using their 101 number, not the Parish Clerk.

The blocking of drains has recently caused a problem. The Parish Council is liaising with Anglian Water with regard to this issue, but would request that no fat or fatty substances, wet wipes or nappies are flushed into the system as these items will inevitably exacerbate the problem.

Another major concern of the Parish Council is the public transport system and we are working to try to improve this. A questionnaire is included with this copy of the Syresham Times. If the lack of public transport is causing concern to you or if you have opinions you wish to express on this subject, please complete the questionnaire and return it as requested.

Now that the clocks have been turned back and the nights draw in, the issue of street lights comes again to the fore. We would remind residents that the Parish Council has an ongoing street lighting project and reports will be issued to residents as the project progresses.

FROM ANDREA LEADSOM, MP

Residents will be pleased to hear that

the development of the new Brackley Medical Centre is proceeding apace, and progress is being made on the access route and other enabling works. I am



hoping to visit the site in early January to see how they are getting along, and I look forward to it opening by the end of 2019.

The new building will comprise a new suite of GP rooms, a pharmacy, a range of outpatient services to allow people to be treated closer to home, and a reinstatement of the step-down intermediate care beds that were lost

when the Brackley Cottage Hospital closed. This is a huge win for Brackley and surrounding villages like Syresham, and I know everyone will welcome its grand opening.

Some people have been in touch to share their concerns about the impact of the closure of the A422 through Farthinghoe, and the increase in associated traffic on the B4525. The Environment Agency has finally given permission to Northants Highways to allow them to begin the repair works to the Farthinghoe Bridge, and the County Council has indicated that they anticipate the road will reopen before the end of the year after around 3 weeks of works.

Similarly, I know that many residents of Svresham have been affected by the closure of the A5 through Towcester whilst Highways England has been undertaking substantial carriageway repair works. A number of businesses have been in touch with me to raise concerns about the loss of trade, and I monitoring the scheduled am completion of the work closely. Of course, residents have welcomed the temporary removal of HGVs through the town centre, and this has reinvigorated interest in the early delivery of the Towcester Relief Road. You will be pleased to hear that I convened a further meeting a few weeks ago with Persimmon Homes and the District Council to discuss progress on securing an agreement to fully fund road's the early construction; we had a very positive conversation and continue to explore an approach which would bring the road forward to the end of 2021. This is in lieu of the current arrangements where the developer only has to build the relief road once the 1,016th house is sold and occupied, which may not happen until the mid/late 2020s. I will of course update through my website with further developments as soon as I can. As ever, please do not hesitate to contact me if you have any specific concerns or queries.

THE SCHOOL AND NURSERY

Life continues to be busy here at the school. We have welcomed 12 new children into our Reception class, from nurserv last vear, making our transition very easy for children, parents and teachers alike. The benefits of having a nursery are endless. The children have specialist music, PE and French lessons as well as having the opportunity to interact with the older pupils. We are developing a strong early years team who work together to provide a high standard of care and education for the children.

Thanks to the help and support of the local community the children are all benefitting from the refurbished school gardens. The space that they have to play in at the back of school is so much bigger and allows the children to be playing football, table tennis, tag, climbing on the timber trail or rolling down the hill! Playtime has never been so much fun!

In the classroom KS2 continue to have fun with their learning as well as achieving good results. This year in KS2. 70% of our children achieved the expected standard in the National curriculum assessments in all subjects, compared to the national figure of 64%. This included 80% achieving the expected standard or above in reading and grammar, 70% in Maths and 90% in writing. All of these figures show an improving trend for the school and all are well above the national figures. While as a school, our broad and balanced curriculum and the children are always at the heart of our teaching, it is pleasing to see that this education also enables our children to achieve well.

We are always pleased to welcome visitors to our school and nursery. We currently have spaces in most classes and in the nursery for both two and three year olds. So, if you would like to come and have a look around, or know someone with young children in need of a school place or childcare, please give us a call!

When Carole Peters King left us in order to take up another job with the Bishop of Salisbury in August, we were faced with the prospect of a second interregnum in

under seven years and the third one with which I, as a churchwarden, have been associated.

We were fortunate to have had Rev Canon John Roberts as our Rector from 1993-2005, and then to have had a transition period of only six weeks before Rev William Adams, already living at Whitfield in the Astwell Benefice, succeeded him in 2005. Will left us in 2012 and we then advertised the post of Rector of the Astwell Benefice (six churches) that Autumn.

She started here in June 2013.

During the present interregnum, Wiggy Smith will take some of the Communion Services, and outside priests, PTOs will take other services. Syresham will continue with its two lay -led services on the second and fourth Sundays. Will Adams may be available for individual baptisms, weddings and funerals, but it working mainly for Brackley St Peter's, and helping in the four other parishes in the Deanery that have a vacancy.

John Roberts will be available for occasional services in the Astwell Benefice, and he has already kindly agreed to take our Midnight Mass at 9.30p.m. on Christmas Eve at St James Church.


