LANCE LEWENS, JANUARY 1941 TO AUGUST 2016

First and foremost Lance was a family man. We always came first. When we married he took on two grown up stepdaughters and we had a happy family life. We have two grandchildren John, 17 and Anna, 13 who Lance loved dearly, and he was so proud of them.

Lance was gregarious, always socially, physically and mentally active. He lived his life to the fullest, squeezing the most out of every ounce of it. And he was always up to something!

He had so many interests and hobbies and such a wealth of knowledge in so many subjects.

His list of accomplishments grew after retiring from the Prison Service. growing vegetables, (he and Roy Hawkins started up the vegetable show in Syresham again), swimming instructor, writing children's stories and reading them to the children at the primary school. He ran a DIY business for a few years, became a wood turner and carpenter, and he joined me in enjoying the Friendship Club when time permitted, alongside wine and cider making and listening to Pavarotti. He was involved in Syresham's first pantomime, Cinderella and I believe the pantomime is still going strong today. Lance really enjoyed cooking and his stir-fried



vegetables were a treat. He loved walking the dogs in Whistley Woods selecting sticks to turn into

walking sticks, and really enjoyed his time with the Brackley Male Voice Choir and the Syresham Singers.

He wrote and directed a play about the Syresham Martyr, John Kurd which was performed in St James Church. He was keen on all sports and loved watching it all on TV in the Sports Club with Roy Hawkins, John Whitehead, Micky Beecher and many others whose company he enjoyed. All of us who knew Lance well will recall him for certain aspects of his life in Syresham for a long time to come.

We made our move to Church Langley in good time, as we realise in retrospect, to be near our family and enjoy their closeness for the time he had left. His death has left us all so devastated, it all happened so quickly but there will never be another like him. His spirit will remain with us always, as will our love for him. We all miss him so much.

BACAU TO SYRESHAM – AVA'S JOURNEY

On the 10th of March in a shelter in Bacau (in Romania) a litter of 5 crossbreed puppies was born. One was a beautiful girl, called Ava. She spent the first four months of her life knowing only a pen, an earth floor and a couple of humans. Then one day, she and her brothers and sisters were put into a crate in a car and taken to a vet. They were deflea'd, wormed, given injections including rabies, and put back in a crate and then driven from Bacau to the English channel.

After a ferry ride they spent 2 days in DEFRA quarantine. On Saturday morning 30th July, 3 people arrived in another car, popped her into another crate, and brought her to a new home—here in Syresham!

Can you imagine how scared she was? At first she would simply lay on the floor under the table. She had never been in a house; doorways were scary, and she didn't know grass. There were so many noisy machines in and out the house and so many people about.



We sat on the pavement as lorries and tractors passed by. We stroked her to show her that it was all alright. If she is really freaked she sits behind you with one

paw on your leg for security. She soon learned that butterflies are not Ninjas of doom, and started to chase them! Although she still dives to the floor like a starfish when something new appears.

Everyone we have come across on our strolls around the village has been so kind and friendly, helping us with her socialising, thank you for that. She loves to sit next to you with one paw on your leg or arm for comfort, and has started learning to play and bark.

problem. enormous street dog Hundreds upon hundreds are living off what they can scavenge from bins and rubbish. But a Banbury based charity is doing its best to try to help. http:// www.sadiessdr.org/ and they go out to Bacau at least once a month. They teach them how to build and run proper shelters. They are working with the Mayor of Bacau to run a spaying and neutering programme they bring in over 40 puppies a month, yes 40 a month!!! We are really grateful to Peta and Lesley for bringing Ava to safety and into our home, she has our hearts already. Please come and say hello to her if you see us on our walks together.

FROM OUR COUNTY COUNCILLOR

In May of this year I became Cabinet Member for Transport, Highways and Environment. Currently, I chair the *HS2 Liaison Group*, covering the affected villages and towns of South Northants. My Division is the most affected in the County so I am fully aware of the impact that HS2 will have on this largely rural area.

The HS2 Liaison Committee continues to provide support to its members and to hold HS2 to account as much as possible as well as working closely with our local MP.

In Terms of Highways and road repairs many of you will have noticed the deployment of *Road-Master* throughout the County. We currently have four of these teams in the County and this shows our unique approach to repairs while continuing to deliver value for money. Although not a permanent fix, it does allow us to repair larger areas quickly.

The roll out of *superfast broadband* continues across the county and hopefully phase 3 of the programme will include a solution for those directly connected to the exchange and once a preferred bidder has been identified I will push for this solution to come forward.

I have been contacted by a number of villagers regarding the removal of the local *bus services* to and from the village. The situation remains beyond our control as Stagecoach can no longer afford to run the service.

Stagecoach were approached by my officers and your Parish Council at

their meeting on 28th April, regarding possible rerouting a number of journeys on the service between Silverstone and Towcester via Syresham. However on each occasion the company has stated that this would not be feasible due to the lack of time in the schedule to do so.

The County-Connect bus service, which is subsidised by the council may provide a solution to this problem. This demand-responsive service provides a link from Whittlebury and Syresham to Towcester, where you can catch a Stagecoach service to Northampton or Milton Keynes.

The County Council continues to respond to the economic challenges that it faces and although there are going to be some difficult decisions to be made I can assure you that the budget for this year and next year will balance . The pressures on Adult Social Care and Children's services continue to be enormous and this combined with dramatic cuts in government funding have proved challenging .

Finally I can confirm that I will be pledging my full Empowerment Fund for 2017/18 to assist the village with the building of the new village Hall. This amounts to £5,000.00 and as soon as it becomes available I will organise details with the Parish Council.

Elections in 2017 for County Council are not far away, I hope that I will be

DEALING WITH POWER CUTS


As we move into autumn and the darker evenings approach, there's nothing more inconvenient than a power cut.


