From the Editor's desk

As I write on November 5th and a TV mini series ends telling the story of the Gunpowder Plot, I am reminded of the many decades of unrest in the country over the centuries. The great tensions between Roman Catholicism and Protestantism back in the 15th to 17th Centuries dominated English Politics. Local Warwickshire born Sir Robert Catesby, together with a group of like minded Catholics who hated the persecution and oppression of the first Elizabethan age, joined together in a plot to kill the new King James I.

Guido (Guy) Fawkes was credited with being responsible, but in fact 13 influential landed gentry, several from our own county, allegedly met at Ashby St Legers, near Daventry and plotted to kill the king at the opening of Parliament in 1605.

We shall never know what might have transpired had the plot been successful. It is estimated that the 2,500kg of explosive hidden beneath the houses of parliament would have obliterated some 500 square metres in the surrounding area.

Allegedly it was William Parker (after whom a school in Daventry was named) who wrote to his brother to warn him of the imminent dangers and caused the plot to be discovered.

We remember these events each year with bonfires, fireworks and great fun. *Ian Draper, November 2017*



SYRESHAM PARISH COUNCIL



Our Parish Councillors have

continued to work for the benefit of the village during the Summer holiday period. You may have noticed that all but one of the benches that are situated in various locations around the village have recently been renovated. The remaining bench in Abbey Road will soon be repaired and a plaque will be attached to the bench to show the provenance of the lime trees in Abbey Road. The Parish Council thanks Syresham History Society for providing the plaque.

There are a few concerns that have recently been brought to the attention of the Council. Firstly the issue of parking on the pavement. This is a very serious matter, as it blocks the pavement, especially for wheelchairs and pushchairs and elderly residents, forcing people to walk in the road and thereby potentially causing a very serious accident. Obviously no-one would wish to cause such an accident, so the Parish Council appeals to all drivers to park safely and sensibly within the village.

Secondly it has been reported that some people have been putting dog litter in other peoples' domestic bins when these bins have been put out for emptying on Thursdays. There is no excuse for such anti-social behaviour as the village has five dog litter bins in various locations in the village used by dog walkers and it is now also possible to put dog litter in the ordinary litter bins located around the village. If none of these are convenient, please take your litter home and put it in your own bin!

Thirdly there is the matter of obtaining planning permission for alterations or additions to private residences. It would appear that some people are by-passing this process and are only applying for retrospective planning permission when the Enforcement Officer has become involved. We are therefore including a separate article in the next issue of the Syresham Times giving the basic rules of planning.

On a more positive note, one of the

responsibilities of the Parish Council is to make sure that the village has a village hall that is fit for purpose and we are therefore giving our support to the new village hall project. The construction of the new hall, as is evident to see, is now moving on apace. It is anticipated that the hall will be ready to occupy in the Spring and we look forward to the grand opening!

The Parish Council has also begun an initial investigation into the possibility of upgrading street lighting in the village. A questionnaire will soon be delivered to each household and we ask that you take a few minutes to complete this very important survey.

The Parish Council would like to take this opportunity to invite residents to join them at the memorial stone in Abbey Road at 10.45 a.m. on Saturday 11th November for a short Remembrance event at 11.00 a.m.

And finally, as 2017 comes to an end, may we be the first to wish all residents of the parish a very Happy Christmas and a Healthy, Happy and Successful New Year!

BE SAFE NOT SORRY WITH OIL TANK SECURITY

Imagine having your oil stolen, your

tank damaged and then being faced with a hefty clean up cost, which is unlikely to be covered by your insurance. This is the reality if you don't maintain the security of your tank.

In recent years, the Environment Agency has seen an increase in the number of oil thefts and pollution incidents in early Autumn, as the nights draw in and people start to re-fill their oil tanks for winter heating.

Please check that your oil tank is secure and that it has not become damaged over the summer. It is a good idea to have your tank within a secondary bund to collect any spills or leaks.

This will prevent pollution into the local stream and reduce the impact on water quality and wildlife. If you do have an incident or see any pollution then please call the **Environment Agency 24hour incident hotline on 0800-80-70-60**

NEW BUS ROUTES IN PLACE

From <u>Monday 6th November, 2017</u> two bus route changes are introduced. These are being paid for by Section 106 contributions in Brackley, Silverstone and Towcester and mark a strategic improvement for the area.

Service 88—will be extended to Brackley to provide a restored hourly bus service between Brackley and Northampton, six days a week. *BUT not via Syresham!*

Service 91—A brand new express bus service from Brackley, Silverstone and parts of Towcester directly in to Milton Keynes, every hour six days a week.

The construction of the new nursery has lead to a number of changes outside at school with the moving of the timber trail and the demolition of the old mobile and catering pod. This in turn has created an excellent opportunity for us to create an amazing new outdoor learning area that will engage and inspire our Early Years and KS1 children.

£10k is a huge amount of money for our little school and it is difficult to overstate what a massive impact an injection of cash like this could have for the whole school.


