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NEWS FROM THE RECTORY

This month I have some very good news to report – makes a change from all the stress of the previous 18 months or so!



The second piece of good news is that following correspondence and voting from people on the church electoral rolls across the Benefice, and an open meeting on Monday 6th September it was confirmed by a more than two thirds majority that the parishes of the Benefice wished to remain part of the united Astwell Benefice structure. From the viewpoint of Syresham, this means that the parish continues to have input into the Benefice life and will be represented on the Benefice PCC and joint committees for Worship, Finance, Pastoral care and social events. However, the structure also allows for local control of church and churchyard



maintenance and enhancement, local parish finances and parish based social event planning. This plan now needs to be signed off by the Bishop's Council, which should happen by the end of the year — to my mind, another opportunity for a celebration when that happens!

The main advantages are that there will be support for Syresham parish from the larger Benefice group, and I will be freed to do what I consider to be the most important parts of a Parish Priest's job — arranging worship, carrying out pastoral care, journeying with people through life events and taking baptism services, weddings, and funerals out of that ministry and supporting everyone in their Christian walk of faith.

Please do not hesitate to get in touch with me if you would like a coffee and chat — or a walk — I am happy to meet anyone — churchgoer or not! Also, do look out for me at some of our Christmas services/activities.

Dates that have been confirmed so far include the St Nicholas Fair on 4th December and the joint carol service with the Chapel 19th December at 6pm.

We are also planning Christingle services and a Christmas HC service on Christmas Eve and a Christmas Morning Family Service — look out for more information nearer the time.

TOWCESTER AREA DOOR-TO-DOOR COMMUNITY TRANSPORT

Towcester Area Door -to-Door (TADD) is a long-established charity operating a door-to door community transport service for people across the West Northants area. The service enables the elderly and disabled to attend medical and well-being related appointments and services. TADD is affordable and helps people retain independence in the absence of suitable public transport and avoid reliance on family, friends and neighbours.

During COVID there has been dramatic decrease in the number of journeys made, however we have continued to provide transport for who needed it. Routine those appointments are beginning to be made once again, the flu and booster vaccine campaign is starting up and we are seeing an increase in requests for transport. If you, or anyone you know, would benefit from accessing the service please do get in touch.

We desperately need volunteer drivers in many rural villages. There are many elderly, disabled or isolated people who rely on TADD, so if you have a little spare time and are a driver, please consider volunteering to help your neighbours. You never know when you might need to use the service yourself! Drivers need to have access to a car, be available on a fairly regular basis and are required to complete a DBS check. Mileage is reimbursed at the HMRC

rate, insurance premiums are not impacted and journeys are allocated weekly by mutual agreement.

FROM YOUR WNC COUNCILLOR

I am delighted to be looking after Syresham as one of your three new West



Northamptonshire Councillors for the Silverstone Ward along with Alison Eastwood and Charles Manners. As I



live in the south of the Ward, in Silverstone village, and all three of us are Conservatives, I have taken the mantle for the parishes in that part — including Syresham — with

Charles looking after the villages across the centre of the Ward and Alison those in the top third.

Having lived in South Northants since 1981 and Silverstone since 1986, I know your village well and have enjoyed many a pint in the King's Head over the years, often as respite from working on classic vehicles, which I kept at Kingshill Farm some years ago. Since the election, I have attended your

parish council meetings and have worked with your councillors on several issues.

Until the election in May, I had been a South Northants Councillor since 2003, having been Chairman in 2010 and most recently on the Cabinet as Portfolio Holder for Environmental Services and Chairman of the Moat Lane Regeneration Project Board for Towcester. My background is in the automotive industry and motorsport, with a special interest in classic cars and motorcycles.

Although the formation of WNC was not universally welcomed, I feel that residents are now realising that it will benefit residents. It provides a lot of opportunities to address some of the issues from the past and also to plan for the future and that is what we are concentrating on at the moment.

The challenges that we face at the moment are mainly due to external pressures; in particular demands for housing, environmental issues and pressure from industrial developers. We recognise that this part of the county is rural and as such we will strive to maintain it that way.

One of the issues causing a lot of angst is HS2. Its effect on residents in this part of South Northants is becoming more and more of an issue. Although HS2 does not directly impact on Syresham, it is very close and neighbouring Radstone is one of the worst affected villages. Endless deliveries of materials by truck and the large number of workers on the site,

which stretches right across the county, create noise and nuisance and we are working with the contractors to ensure that mitigation is as effective as possible. This includes doing our best to ensure that HS2 sticks to agreed practices and routes and to help those residents who have related issues. Most of the Northants part of the track runs through Alison's end of Silverstone Ward and she has become our 'specialist' on such matters for the railway, which is not due to open until 2026.

The next major consultation is the West Northamptonshire Strategic Plan and the Spatial Options Consultation, which is in progress at the moment. Your parish council is aware of this and you can find out all about it at https://westnorthantsplan.inconsult.uk/.

There is a link to a document that can be downloaded and printed if necessary **'West** called Northamptonshire Strategic Plan Spatial Options Consultation'. This gives full information on proposals for future development including maps showing possible sites. As far as Syresham is concerned, the nearest sites in the consultation are both for urban extensions and are adjacent to Brackley (to the west) and Towcester (to the south and north east).

I look forward to continuing to do what I can for Syresham and I'm only down the road if you need any help with West Northamptonshire Council related matters.

SYRESHAM ART EXHIBITION 2021

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

The work of the Parish Council has continued apace in

the last three months. We hope that you have noticed the new dog fouling signs that the Parish Council has provided and we request ALL dog walkers and owners to heed these signs. We know that most already do, but unfortunately there always seem to be a few people who don't.

There is a separate notice in this edition detailing the consequences of failing to pick up after your pet, and also details of what those who witness such an event must do.

After complaints of the lack of a dog litter bin at Whistley Woods, the Parish Council was given permission by the Forestry Commission to put a bin at the entrance to the wood. This is a trial measure and the Forestry Commission will ask the Council to remove it if it is not used. So, if you walk your dog in Whistley Wood, please use it and make sure that the area around the bin is neat and tidy. 'Use it or Lose it' as the saying goes!

The Parish Council wishes to keep residents up to date on events and issues that concern the village and themselves. To this end, the Clerk will issue email alerts about road closures, HS2 works, etc. Pocket Park users, will have noticed that a pontoon has been installed next to the pond so that it is now possible for activities such as pond dipping to take place. Life saving



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HEALTH AND SOCIAL CARE

Overcoming delays caused by the Covid19 Pandemic, the long awaited health and care facility opened in the autumn of 2020 with the first rehabilitation



In the summer we were able to welcome back partner organisations with MIND able to recommence their weekly group from the wellbeing suite which is situated to the left of the main entrance on the ground floor. We are now planning for the opening of the café and to increase the range and number of groups being provided to include a Memory Hub (approach currently being successfully tested in Corby) and Strength and Balance classes to help reduce risk of falls, especially for people who have spent significant periods of the past two years shielding.

We initially opened with eight beds in use on the second floor with an



increase to ten in the summer and to date almost 60 patients have been supported with their recovery through the new local beds.

The NHS nationally has set out a vision of

increasing the range of outpatient and diagnostic/near patient testing, traditionally provided at large Acute Hospital sites, which should be available in local community hubs. The new facility at Brackley is highlighted as the type of integrated health and care venue which will support this, building on initial x-ray capacity, and we expect an ongoing increase in the range of services provided locally for all ages.

The amazing fundraising in support of the new facility continues to benefit additional local people with equipment to support work physiotherapists, assisting inpatients with their recovery and ongoing care and, when the x-ray facility is fully functioning, increasing the type and number of tests which can be undertaken at Brackley. We will be forever grateful for all of the support of the people of Brackley and surrounding villages. To create the new facility has been a collective team effort over many years!

We know that the next few months will be very testing for health and social care with the combination of ongoing pandemic, greater risk from flu and the backlog for elective care but are confident that the wonderful new facility in Brackley will play a key part in helping to successfully navigate the immediate future and enable us to continue to create enhanced service provision locally for many years to come.

At present we are busy filling shoe boxes and these have to be in Chapel by November 15th. All the necessary forms are in the Chapel so we do encourage you to take part in this.

When you see the faces of the children who receive them it is wonderful as they have virtually nothing, a shoe box of goods is received with so much joy.

Breakfast Church meets once a month and it is so encouraging to see so many families joining us.

IRENE HOLGATE - 1927 TO 2021

Irene was born in Leicester on 17th
February 1927, to parents Charles and
Violet Beasley. Her father was a
carpenter and her mother a
housewife

Irene did well at school and progressed to teacher training college and became a primary school teacher. She remained a teacher for many years and

thoroughly enjoved her job. Once when returning to school for the autumn term found she rather a large wasp's nest in the corner of the ceiling.



The nest was multi-coloured as the wasps had eaten lots of coloured paper in the classroom. The children thought it was wonderful and perhaps reflects what a colourful character Irene herself was.

Irene married Nigel Parkinson in 1949. He was a successful chartered accountant practising in the Leicester area. In due course Irene had 2 children Philip and Chrissie.

Irene had a long term friend from Leicester nicknamed Puffer - real name Richard Pougher. They later married in 1979 and moved to the Isle of Wight shortly afterwards, to live in Chrissie's family holiday home. Irene really loved it on the island with the mild climate and her colourful garden. Sadly Puffer passed away shortly after the move, but Irene had no desire to move.

Some time later, Irene met Bill Holgate and they married in 1989. Bill was a dentist in the Royal Navy and had achieved the auspicious rank of Rear Admiral! A fact that Irene never made known was that Bill Holgate's portrait hangs in the National Portrait Gallery in London! Sadly Bill passed away at the age of 82, but Irene stayed in their house with Bill's son Adrian. However, she wasn't really very happy there. So her daughter Chrissie, in Brackley, persuaded her to move and in 2000 Irene arrived in Syresham.

Irene soon proved her energy and enthusiasm by joining in lots of village activities. In fact it is hard to think of any organisation she didn't become a member of – Bowls Club, the History Society, the Gardening Club, the Friendship Club, the Church and the Chapel. She was on the rota with Barbara providing some of Syresham's renowned cricket teas, and when she wasn't doing that she could often be seen at the Sports and Social Club on a Saturday afternoon supporting our local cricket team. Irene joined in the Scarecrow **Festival** every vear. sometimes running a stall and then organising а delicious Sunday evening supper for all the helpers which was very much appreciated. Irene would always be one of the first, if not THE first, to volunteer and was always a willing and reliable helper at numerous village events. She was also on the Coffee Shop rota and produced some splendid home made cakes. She joined in lots of village events. It is true to say that she possessed a true community spirit.

Irene loved her garden here in Syresham and the more colour the better! Latterly I was more than delighted to help her keep her garden tidy and she would always be bringing colourful plants home for me to plant. She always made me a cup of tea, except when my wife Christina came to visit, and then we would sit out on the back decking with a gin and tonic!

Irene loved her independence and the symbol of this was the Honda. She was fearless in this car and well into the pandemic she continued to drive into Brackley to do her shopping at Tesco. No deliveries for Irene! Irene loved her Honda and wrote off the Audi her grandson had lent her so she could get the Honda back!! She was a lady who did not want to sit around. She always wanted to be active, sociable and join in the Syresham community. When she was ninety two and still volunteering to help at village events, my wife asked her if she was sure it was not too much for her.

Irene's reply was that she would continue to help for as long as she was physically able, and that is just what she did – it just took a pandemic to stop her!

Latterly Irene's health began to fail, but, thanks to her grandson and daughter and a trusty wheelchair, she was able to enjoy the Scarecrow Festival this Summer, Strawberry Teas with the Friendship Club and a final visit to the Coffee Shop. This lady did so much for our village and I know she will be sadly missed here.

However, in this area our contribution to lowering our carbon footprint and living a lifestyle that is healthier for ourselves and the whole planet could be by supporting the widening of the A43 bridge that crosses the HS2 into Brackley. The widening would be to include a multi-use pathway with a safety barrier between the traffic and users. This safe crossing would link to a multi-use path from Brackley to Silverstone via Syresham, with a spur off to Crowfield. It would allow all users to travel safely between local towns, villages and hamlets without using the A43, the Welsh Lane or a motor car.

If you are not a parent and buggy, walker, cyclist, e-biker, e-scooterist, mobility scooter or wheelchair user then think of the next generations to come who might have to be.

The cost of these pathways is minimal compared with the cost to the NHS for obesity, heart disease, stroke, diabetes type 2 and mental health treatment.

An estimate of unreported injuries has been included in the 'value of prevention of accidents', which can be found here:- https://www.gov.uk/government/statistical-data-sets/ras60
-average-value-of-preventing-road-

accidents. We estimate that the total value of prevention of unreported injury accidents at around £17bn a year, the value of damage-only accidents at around £4bn a year and the total value of prevention of reported injury accidents at around £12bn a year. This gives a total estimate for all reported and unreported accidents of around £33bn per year.

Andrea Leadsom MP and Shane Snow (DfT) have campaigned on our behalf, for the crossing of HS2 and the multiuse path. The decision about the widening of the bridge will be made by the end of this year so if you want the opportunity to contribute towards a carbon neutral environment please sign the letters of support for their work. Copies should be circulating or sign the copy in the Post Office. These signatures will be sent to Shane Snow and Andrea Leadsom MP plus copies to lobby local Councillors.

Thank you everyone who has signed the letters so far. If the bridge is widened and the paths are built, you and many generations to come will get choices about how you travel and how you keep the natural environment thriving.

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


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
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
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
